Saturday, October 19 started really early as Rich Bassemir and I met up at D-Boone's in Florence to convoy into Pistons on the Square in Georgetown. At 7:15am, getting spaces together on the inner east side was possible. We walked around until Lamppost Coffee opened up at 8:00am and got properly caffeinated. Doug Wenger met up with us after 9:00am and then pulled around for the start just before 10:00am. The morning was chilly, during the drive was pleasant, and, by the end of the day, it had gotten hot. It was always a clear blue sky and Doug was pressured by a stranger to kick it roof down.

We got underway and would be hit with many detours right off – the first being Austin Avenue has bridge work going on detouring all traffic to the east lanes. Driving into Georgetown on FM 971 from the tollway a couple of nights before made it known to me that CR 152 had some sort of issue but I decided to wing it and trust the state communicating it with detour signs. It worked out and only added a half mile to take Inner Loop to where CR 152 was back open. I lucked out and didn't break the first mini-tour rule: know where you are going and test it out in advance on a similar day and time – make sure it is not under construction or otherwise broken. Does it mean testing the whole route? We'll see. But first, detour number three – to address "number one" and another mini-tour rule: full gas tank, empty bladder. We had a lot of miles to go so we pulled into Berry Springs Park and Preserve knowing they had good facilities. Whew!

The three of us meandered circuitously northeast from Georgetown through Walburg, Theon, New Corn Hill, Schwertner, and Bartlett. These were mostly familiar roads and then we took the highway through Holland and headed further east into more obscure territory where we crossed the replacement bridge next to Sparks Bridge – kind of a *Dukes of Hazzard* style obstacle.

→ Some of the comments on the tour was that followers had no real idea where they were . . . but didn't really care as they were just taking in the sky, hilly terrain, animals and farmhouses. Every once in a while, they would just see if I was still there in front of them. The back roads were long and remote enough to forget there was a highway nearby. But then we had to get on the highway to avoid being on a rutted gravel road for a mile.

On a previous excursion, I trusted Google enough that the roads would connect to prevent burning gas to test it. I'm glad I drove this one as even an alternate route was not paved. But it was John Haydon that had tested the route with his sister navigating to let me know the highway exits were confusing. So I hadn't driven ALL of the roads – but *someone* had.

After 55 miles of the tour's first leg were behind us, we came upon a rest stop where we were joined by John Haydon and Amy Stecker and greeted with chairs in the shade, cold drinks, hot coffee, and cookies – complete with tablecloths and ice bucket – it was so welcoming and classy. That alone would have made the trip worthwhile but It just kept getting better as we had the opportunity to see a member's unique car collection and get the history behind them.




Buick Maintenance By Wayne Heikkila

Hi, everyone. After purchasing the Buick, I went online and purchased a CD repair manual and a copy of the owner's manual. When they arrived, the first one I looked at was the owner's manual. Inside I found some very interesting information and maintenance schedules. It lists all the different body styles along with the model 40 series through the 90 series – wheelbase, vehicle weight, tire size, engine displacement, horsepower, fluid capacities, and engine specs. This was just to start with! Then it went on with tune up, timing and carburetor adjustments. Then came the maintenance information:

- Weekly check tire pressure
- Every two weeks check battery fluid
- 1,000 miles lube all locations, check all fluid levels and wash engine of engine oil
- 2,000 miles complete all the above listed items along with: change oil, clean air filter and fuel filter
- Every 5,000 miles complete all listed above along with minor tune-up: clean spark plugs and points, check timing and adjust carburetor, rotate / balance tires.
- Every 10,000 miles complete all listed above along with major tune-up: replace spark plugs and points, check timing and adjust carburetor, wash the copper gauze for the crankcase ventilation, clean rocker arm oil line screen, check steering gear adjustment.
- Every spring: drain transmission and rear end and install new fluid. Drain and flush coolant system. Pack front wheel bearings. Drain and refill shocks and steering gear.

□ For the fall of the year, it just said have all systems checked for winter.

After looking through all this maintenance. I wondered how many people completed this schedule. After reading this. I had to ask myself, "Does my car still have the rocker arm screen?" The engine has been rebuilt. I know the shocks had not been kept up with. Anyway, I hope you found this information as interesting as I did. I will say Adriana and I have been enjoying driving it around. It purrs down the road at 60mph just fine. I still have things to check before we head out for any long trips. Road tripping season is almost upon so get your cars out and blow some dust off them.






Cheapest Repair Ever

The clear fuel filter is about the best thing that has ever happened to the 1950 Packard. The tank is new, the lines are clean, the carb is rebuilt and fresh and the fuel pump is a recent remanufactured part. It had been a couple of weeks since it was driven – and it had traveled a long way then – but still wouldn't start. It would chug along on starter fluid for a few seconds and ran fine for a minute when the carburetor bowl was filled and primed. There was nothing splashing in the fuel filter. The carburetor was not getting gas!

As a troubleshooting measure, I disconnected the fuel line going into the pump

and ran a short length of hose to a gas can under the car and primed the carburetor again. The engine would idle fine and gas would splash into the filter. However, if I revved it up, the level in the filter would slowly decrease and no gas was coming from the pump . . . the *vacuum assisted* fuel pump. The only other thing that uses vacuum is the windshield wipers and the antenna (which is not hooked up). I removed the vacuum line from the wiper actuator and plugged it with my thumb then revving it made more gas splashes! I replaced the 9-inch vacuum hose with a little clamp at the wipers. Fixed it! No trips to Autozone and no parts from Max Merritt needed.

First Electric Car The first successful electric car in the United States dates back to 1890, when chemist William Morrison from Des Moines, Iowa designed a practical and functional electric vehicle. Morrison's invention marked the dawn of electric cars in America, setting the stage for a new era of transportation. Morrison's electric vehicle could reach a speed of up to 14 miles per hour, which was impressive for its time. The car featured 24 battery cells and could operate for several hours on a single charge,

although its range was limited compared to modern standards. The vehicle itself resembled a carriage, as automobiles were still in their infancy, and lacked many of the features we associate with cars today, such as power steering or advanced suspension systems.

Morrison's electric car was not commercially mass-produced but it helped spark interest in electric vehicles, which were seen as cleaner, quieter, and easier to operate than gasoline-powered alternatives. Electric cars gained popularity in the late 19th and early 20th centuries, especially in urban areas where driving distances were shorter, and recharging stations could be more easily established.

The success of this early electric vehicle paved the way for further development in the electric automobile industry, which, despite the rise of internal combustion engines, remains a key part of transportation innovation today.
