

After turning right on Whitehead, you will turn right on NE 1st Street and check in at the tent which will be located in the parking lot of


the Smithville Masonic Lodge.

Morgan Military Aviation Museum Commemoration of the 80th Anniversary of Victory in Europe Day

I couldn't tell you how I found out about it, but the Cameron Municipal Airpark's Facebook post for the event included the note "We would love to have cars from the '30s and '40s join us!" This resonated with me because my 1939 Chrysler is the car my grandparents drove during the war.

I arrived at the airpark and was greeted by Nanette Morgan, who runs the Morgan

Military Aviation Museum along with her husband. She asked me to park next to the only other civilian vehicle, a beautifully restored 1939 Dodge Truck. The truck's owner and I spent a fair amount of time comparing and contrasting the two Chrysler products, and he pointed out a couple of the visual cues that identify the 1939 straight-6 truck engine from the straight-6 car engine. So many differences, yet so familiar.

→ We were at the end of a row of 4wheeled vehicles from the era that included a handful of Jeeps, a Dodge ambulance, and a 1941 Ford staff car. The tarmac was ringed with a variety of military trainer planes, but as this is still an active airstrip, a couple of civilian aircraft were also present -- a few even landed briefly for refueling. Attendees had the opportunity to take a ride in one of the Jeeps or even in one of the planes in exchange for a donation to the museum. Dr. Rick Morgan soon tracked me down to introduce himself and to thank me for coming. He explained to me that he founded the museum mostly to preserve and teach history, but because it gave him a great excuse to fly his old warbirds from time to

time. I can relate...

Inside the hangar that houses the MMAM, several volunteers dressed in period garb and uniforms were eagerly teaching about the military artifacts and other historical items they had brought. One young lady enlightened us about the emergency medical training offered to female volunteers (long before EMTs and paramedics were even a thing); a young man full battle uniform explained and demonstrated several war-era cameras. including a wind-up movie camera which he used to film the planes as they gave rides. We're all praying for that footage to turn out!

→ Along the back wall of the hangar, maps documented the final push of the Allies chasing the German army out of France, and a series of art prints illustrated scenes on the outskirts of the battlefields. Some of these were touching reminders that wars are not fought by machines, but by human beings. I had a hard time holding back tears while looking over a print titled "Wounded Aboard" - a badly crippled B-17 flies low over the air base and drops flares to indicate that they have casualties aboard, signaling that they require priority landing and to be met by ambulances. You can almost hear the silence as the ground crews stop working and look up in worry and anticipation. This one hit me especially hard because, while my father was a youngster riding in the back seat of his parents' Chrysler, his older brother was serving as a tail gunner on a B-17. This would have been the exact scene as he returned from his last mission aboard the famed "Little Willie". (Fortunately, he survived to collect both a Purple Heart and a Silver Star.)

color noon, a guard Αt ceremony presented the stars and stripes alongside a Texas state flag while patriotic music played the National Anthem, the songs of each branch of the US military, and finally a live singing of "God Bless America". Throughout the day we were treated to wartime music, everything from "Boogie-Woogie Bugle Boy" to songs reminding soldiers not to talk about their activities. I had no idea there was a song with the lyric "even the weather is a military secret!"

The only hiccup in an otherwise beautiful day was a quick splash-and-dash shower which lasted maybe 5 minutes, not nearly long enough to dampen anyone's spirits. On returning home, I paused to take a couple of photos in the driveway. I finally pulled into the garage, and as soon as I turned off the ignition I heard "pitter-pat... pitter-pat..." on the garage roof. I looked out the door just in time to see the start of a heavy, 20-minute downpour. I was reminded of the minister who once told me, "the Lord seems to have a soft spot for old

1967 Lincoln Continental Convertible VIP and Government Parade Car sold for \$170,000 on Bring-a-Trailer.



It was commissioned as a "marketing car" for use in motorcades and parades and served in New York-based presidential motorcades beginning in 1967 and was also used in the motorcade of Pope Paul VI during his 1968 visit to Colombia as well as the 1969 and 1973 Nixon presidential inaugural parades in Washington, D.C. Through 1975, it was used as a VIP car in events featuring members of

the US government and military, astronauts, foreign dignitaries, and celebrities. Finished in Pitcairn Blue over blue leather, the car is powered by a 462ci V8 paired with a three-speed automatic transmission and has been modified with a removable clear hardtop, 1968-style front and rear design elements, articulating spotlights, flag holders, and flashing red lights on the front bumper. Additional features include a power-operated black soft top, rear-hinged rear doors, air conditioning, power windows, a power-adjustable front bench seat, vacuum-operated door locks, and an AM/FM radio.

Setting the record as the longest vehicle in the world, the "Super Limo" seats 75 people, has 26 wheels, includes a jacuzzi tub, a small helipad, and putting green (with the hole being the jacuzzi). It is 100 feet, 1.5 inches long. The museum has a lot of other prominent vehicles like Magnum PI's Ferarri one of the surviving A-Team vans, and Night Rider's K.I.T.T. car.
