

12th Annual Main Street Car Show – Taylor, TX

Late on Friday evening, as the local high school football game was pulled in an hour earlier, lightning lit up the clouds to the north while the wind blew in gulf moisture from the south. By night, the thunder and lightening kept people awake shaking them from their sleep. The WXNW Mini-Tour to Marble Falls, Kingsland, and Burnet had already been postponed because of the rain threats and low water crossings the route intended. That left the 12th Annual Main Street Car Show in Taylor, TX on the agenda.

Last year, this car show drew over 900 vehicles and spilled into every parking space, business, and side street in Taylor. More Issues with the Buick

I took the Buick on our "stick to your seat" tour which was a lot of fun. One of our new members Remy rode with me from the Olive oil Company to Johnson City and the Buick drove fantastic — I couldn't have been happier!

On Monday morning, I had loaded the Buick on the trailer and was about to strap it down when I noticed the right rear wheel showed signs that the axle seal was leaking. If you read my articles, you know I have changed the axle seals and bearings. After getting home and unloading, I started by removing the axles and seals and the first thing I noticed was there was no wear pattern on the axles by the seals. I had to stop and think about this for a while.

The next day, I still really didn't know what I was going to do so I grabbed my measuring tape and measured the passenger side axle tube. From the inside spider gear to

the end of the axle tube, it measured 27 ¼ inches. I then measured the same distance on the driver's side. It measured 26 1/2 inches. I then installed the inner seals and side took measurements: Passenger measured 25 1/2 inches; Driver's side measured 24 ¼ inches. I then installed the outer seals and took a measurement: Passenger side 27 inches; Driver's side 26 ¼ inches. I then measured both axles: Passenger's side from the C-clip to the end of the machined axle: 27 ¼ inches; Driver's side measured 26 ½ inches. Next, I measured the passenger's axle: 25 ½ inches. To my surprise, it didn't make it to the machined surface. I then measured 27 inches for the outer seal and it also landed on a nonmachined surface. I then measured the distance on the driver's side, 24 ¼ inches. To no surprise, it didn't make it to the machined surface either. I then measured 26 ¼ inches for the outer seal. It also landed on a nonmachined surface. I now know what the problem is. What is the fix? \rightarrow

→ Having taken all of these measurements, it turned out they were all needed for Doug – the parts guy and Buick expert. He was impressed that I had measured this out. Initial thoughts were that these are not the original axles because they don't fit the housing.

After speaking with Doug, he said he needed to share the photos with his son Nate. The next day I got a call from Doug and they both agreed with me – I had the wrong axles for the car! Their thoughts were that they are out of a new car but that they have a shelf of axles. It would take time to go through the axles and measure them for the correct length. About a week later, I got a call from Doug and they had found a set of axles that would fit my rear end. Each axle was ¾ of an inch longer and the inner machined area was

where it needed to be for both axles and the outer seal would ride on the inner bearing race as it should. I ended up purchasing new rear axles bearing kits.

I received the replacement axles with the new seals and bearings. The first thing I noticed was the cage on the new bearings was metal instead of plastic like the first bearings purchased. I also had to replace the rear brake shoes due to the shoes being contaminated with gear oil. I decided to inspect the front shoes as well and you could see that cracks had started to form around the rivets. It would just be a matter of time before I had brake failure so I ordered the front as well. After assembling the rear end and installing the new brakes, the Buick was back on the road again and is ready for our next tour.

What I Did Last Summer

Remember in grade school when you had to write a story every day and usually wrote about what you did yesterday? Not always, though, because sometimes what you did yesterday, stays in yesterday. If you went on vacation, you had a virtual treasure trove of topics. You're in luck as Pat and I attended the 75th anniversary of the Midwest Old Threshers Reunion in Mt. Pleasant, Iowa.

We started in Granbury and planned on making it to a rest stop in Missouri – until we got there and saw the closed sign – on to lowa to the first rest stop on I-35. They don't get much nicer – the entire rest stop is an art installation and it's all on one side of the interstate. It has trails, light shades made from agricultural machinery manufacturing scraps, a nod to the Mormon Trail, and more. It's worth a stop if you're passing that way. Around mile marker 8.

We get to Mt. Pleasant early for a good camping spot (1,500+ spaces – they all fill). Old Threshers runs five days and ends Labor Day. The kick-off parade is on Wednesday. We got a kick out of the locals putting their chairs out around noon and waiting for the 3pm parade. There are also things going on in town like city wide garage sale, antique shows, a full town square and more. One day, when we were downtown, we saw a large demonstration at the courthouse against "you know who" (in a small lowa town). Threshers is located at the county fairgrounds and seems about the size of a state fair. The stars of the show are the giant steam tractors of which there are around 60-70. Also, a couple dozen scale steam tractors (my favorite).



There are over 1,000 antique gas tractors, maybe 200 antique lawn tractors, a couple of football fields of hit-and-miss gas engines, a 2-story antique car museum, a truck museum, and an old west town with a depot for the steam trains. There's a "drive a tractor" area where kids can drive an antique tractor under supervision. Also, puppet shows and kid shows. There is an operating live theater with fun, corny shows. I usually come home with a treasure from one of the antique buildings or the Trading Post.

→ The steam carousel is a story unto itself. I used to ride it as a kid when the owner would tow it in every year and set it up near the old west town. At some point, he stopped coming and the carousel disappeared. Later, it was discovered, I believe, in California in a field. The decision was made to purchase it and it was restored and now lives inside of a permanent building on the grounds. There's as much gray hair riding it as there are kids.



There are a couple of museums on the grounds with an amazing display of very large stationary steam engines (one powers all the tools in the machine shop from overhead pulleys), a doll museum, early 19th century history, and an area with numerous working printing presses (they have a printing fair after Threshers). Pat and I came home with a print

that was made with a Kelly Springfield steam road roller. These areas also have food vendors like Amish bakery, fudge store, etc. When it's all over, the museum space becomes storage for the steam tractors. Every day at noon the steam power plant and all of the steam engines blow their whistles and you can hear it all over town!! Every evening, after the grandstand concert, some large steam tractors put on a spark show by shoveling sawdust into their fire boxes. The dance barn is usually quite full most nights and may go till late. Some of these old codgers can really lay it down!!

→ In addition to all of the steam and gas power, there's also a large area of horse power where they operate threshers, saws, pickers – you name it. Sometimes the horses are attached to a rotary "merry go round" and other times they are on a treadmill. In addition to the tractor pulls, they have horse pulls.





The campground is encircled by trolley tracks carrying restored trolley cars from all At the far end of the over the world. campground, away from the fairgrounds, is the log village which replicates life from the 1850's. The volunteers here are fed by volunteers making all of the food over a campfire. Although it's not from the 1850's, you can get some Sioux City Sarsaparilla. This is where we end our days. Instead of listening to the modern country artists in the grandstand, we go to the log village and listen to old time music played on a cabin porch under hanging oil lamps. They finish every evening with "Down to the River to Pray" and

"Ashokan Farewell". Perfect way to end the evening, then we hop on a trolley back to the campground. I asked about playing with them but the Dobro wasn't invented until the 1920's so...no.



There is music everywhere which often dictates our schedule. I encourage you to search Midwest Old Threshers Reunion and check out some of the videos.






Around Town

Glenn Pray, an Oklahoma school teacher, was one of the pioneers of the replicar craze that flourished in the 1980s. He began working on his first replica car in 1963. Before that, he'd already made a name for himself by buying the Auburn-Cord-Duesenberg Company.
