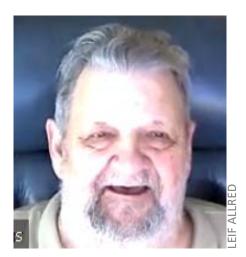

attended Sul Ross College in Alpine, TX where he acquired his teaching credentials. His teaching career took him to Pflugerville where he taught Distributive Education.

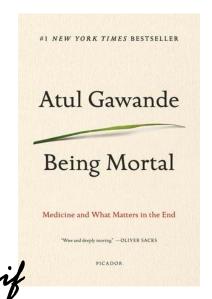

→ Austin Healey made Bugeye Sprites from 1958-1961. The most common is 1960 but I don't know the exact year of this race car. Statement Jags was on Old Spicewood Springs Road. It was a great road for testing sports cars but when it rained you were stuck because there were several low water crossings on each side of us. I caught a cedar tree on fire there while cutting up a VW bug. I was cutting from under the car and the seats caught on fire igniting the tree. Luckily, I had 5 gallons of water and a hose so that prevented a catastrophe. After that, Richard called me Moses of the Burning Bush. We also had a chariot made from the rear of an Austin-Healey that we took turns pulling each other around in. I've checked and the old rock building is no longer there.

I searched my archives to find more of the Sprite and found some pictures of the grounds including the aforementioned pickup and the race car in action at a gymkhana with the boss at the wheel and his wife racing when the door flew open. I remember that moment. Can't be sure if that's the same pickup. I think we had a couple of them and a shot up panel van with bullet holes all over it.



Target Practice

The bike I rode to work was an original Trek (which I still own) that was ordered from Waterloo Wisconsin when Trek was still two guys in a barn building bikes. We ordered a frame and put a Zeus road group on it. It was geared to go fast on flat land and I could keep up with (and occasionally pass) cars going down Spicewood Springs hill. I laid it down once making the transition onto 360 on wet pavement sliding along the pavement and ended up at the guardrail separate from the bike. I put my leg up to absorb the impact and came out unscathed except for a mark on my father's original AACA jacket that I was wearing. As fun as it was to go fast downhill, I was really pumped when I was able to ride up that hill with flat land gears on my bike. Lots of great memories from that time.



Member's Projects

Firing on all Eight

Hi, everyone. Just a short note on the engine. I went back to Joe's and finished hooking up the grounds and installing a new switch to turn on power to the ignition.



Now I was able to crank the engine over without jumper wires and clips. Then I ran a hose down to a fuel can and poured gas down the carburetor. The engine fired off and died. I poured a little more gas down the carb and the engine fired off again then died – but this time I was getting fuel to the filter bowl. Instead of pouring more fuel down the carb, I just cranked it over until it started. After it started, I revved it up over 1,000 rpm for around 5 minutes then turned it off. After letting the engine cool off, I retorqued the head bolts then restarted the engine, ran the RPM up, and warmed the engine up for around 10 minutes before I set the timing. I continued to run the engine varying the RPM for another 10 minutes. During this running, a couple of the freeze plugs started to leak water. In a way, I wasn't surprised. When I installed the new plugs, I noticed they were loose as I was able to just push them in when I was installing After the engine cooled off, I again them. retorqued the head bolts. Later I had to call and

order some more freeze plugs – this time from a different vendor. When the new plugs arrived, they were a 1/6th bigger then the first ones. After the new plugs were installed, I continued with my break-in running the engine for another 30 minutes while varying the RPM. Everything is working great! I let the engine cool down and I retorqued the head bolts for the last time. I have no oil leaks or coolant leaks. I followed the assembly and break-in directions from the Cadillac LaSalle Club. In the end, it worked out great. I'm now looking forward to installing the engine within the next couple weeks. If all goes as planned, I will be driving it soon. My next article on the LaSalle will be about installing the engine. Happy driving, everyone.

Road Trips

National Packard Museum, Warren, Ohio

During the Christmas holidays, we traveled to Northeast Ohio to visit Lynn's 98-year-old mother, Louise. One chilly, grey afternoon, I took a very enjoyable side trip to the National Packard Museum in Warren.

In the second half of the nineteenth century, the Packard family was involved in several successful business enterprises in the area. Their diverse interests included lumber mills, hardware stores, hotels, and an iron rolling mill.

In 1890, William Doud Packard and his brother James Ward Packard established the Packard Electric Company, which produced incandescent bulbs and other electrical products. Later, it focused on the manufacture of ignition systems, wiring harnesses, and other components electrical for manv It was acquired by General manufacturers. Motors in 1932, becoming part of its Delphi Automotive Systems in 1995. In 1999, GM spun off Delphi, which declared bankruptcy in 2005, and the facilities in Warren (with a history going back to 1890) were closed.

Packard One οf Electric's earliest subsidiaries was the New York and Ohio Company, which produced the first Packard Motor Car in 1899. The new manufacturing interest was first known as the Ohio Automobile Company but was renamed the Packard Motor Car Company in 1902. Shortly thereafter, it moved operations to Detroit, where it was a leading manufacturer of excellent luxury cars until June 25, 1956. The Packard-Studebaker Corporation (merger made in hell?) moved production to South Bend, Indiana, where the last Packards (essentially re-badged Studebakers) were made until 1958. Many Packard aficionados consider the last "true" Packards to be 1956 models.



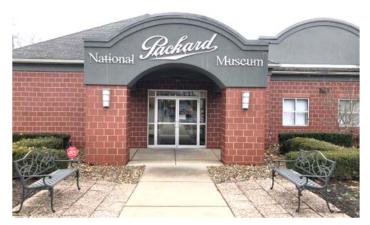

The National Packard Museum opened on July 4, 1999. The 7,500 square-foot facility is located next to the W.D. Packard Music Hall and Packard Park in Warren's historic district. The museum houses a rotating display of original and restored Packard automobiles as well as original documents, photographs, artifacts, and interpretive materials that chronicle the illustrious history of the Packard family, the Packard Motor Car Company, and the Packard Electric Company.

→ The exhibit hall features about 30 vehicles, bookended by a 1900 Model B (said to be the second-oldest surviving Packard) and a 1956 Caribbean hardtop with push-button electronic transmission control.

The museum has two other rare Caribbeans including a 1955 convertible that billionaire Howard Hughes bought for his future wife, Hollywood movie star Jean Peters. Every decade and various models well represented, including a Clipper that, for 1956 only, was promoted (not too successfully) as a separate mid-priced make. One rare eyecatcher is a 1951 Pan American - a two-seat convertible concept car. Only six were built and

displayed over a few years but the design inspired the Caribbean that debuted in convertible-only form in 1953.

Also deserving special attention is the 1941 LeBaron chauffeur-driven limousine that was owned by Mrs. James Ward Packard.

The Road Relics roster indicates ownership of at least a half-dozen Packards. I have the good fortune of watching and lending the occasional third hand to Joe Peter's restoration of a 1953 Caribbean, which is going to be splendid. It is what peaked my visit to this museum that is about a half-hour drive from Youngstown, which we visit every year. If you are ever in Northeast Ohio, I highly recommend spending a couple of hours at this first-class museum.

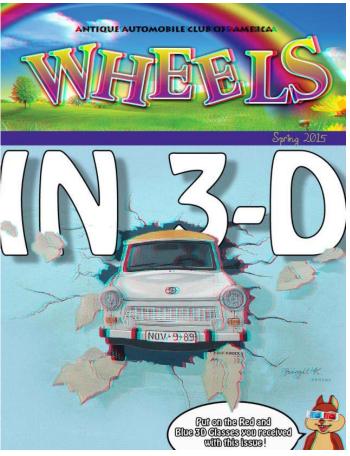
Junior Membership

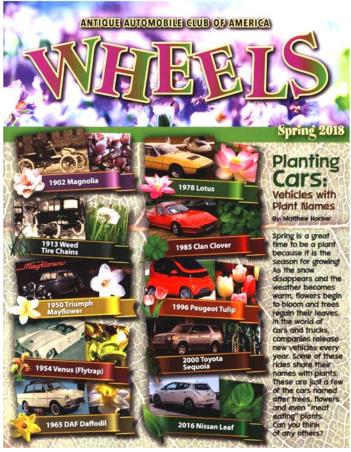
