
## Once Dwned

### A Funny Little Car!

It was in 1948 – I was 12 – when my Dad had been diagnosed with cancer and I received my hardship driver's license in order to take him to his cobalt treatments. I had been talking with him about a car to work on as Dad was not going to the oil field to work as much and would have some time. He built his 'hotrod' in the 1920's from a Model T calling it 'Leaping Tuna." I found a strange little car in the alley behind a dealer repair shop and talked Dad into going to look at it. The owner said he'd sell it for \$15 as it didn't run and that he wasn't a mechanic.

Dad towed it home and we started work. We quickly discovered it had an Austin Seven, 4-cylinder engine that needed to be rebuilt, worn brake pads, paint needing help and some of the wiring requiring restoration. Using a chain hoist attached to the garage framing (after a bit of ceiling joist reinforcement) I pulled the engine and transmission, put it on a home-made cradle and started tear down. I quickly learned about head bolts that go through the head to the nuts inside the combination cast aluminum bell housing and oil pan in one



**Austin Bantam – \$15 in 1949** 



→ unit. If someone tightens them too tight, you can crack the aluminum webbing at the top of the pan through which the head bolts came and were fastened. This pan was cracked in two places and required very careful placement of large heavy washers to span the cracked areas. This is also where I learned the operation of a torque wrench for reassembly.

We found Babbitt rod bearings at which point Dad told me I was going to learn to build proper molds, melt and pour the replacements. That, all by itself, was an education and, after much spilled hot Babbitt, I finally got the molds made to hold the hot material and the bearings were poured. The

fitting, grinding and rasping was also an education, plus loss of quite a bit of finger skin. The final steps were in reassembling the engine with new rings and gaskets. Next was disassembly of the 3-speed transmission which only needed cleaning and re-attaching to the engine to make ready for reinstallation into the car.

Upon finishing, we went for a test drive where we discovered it was so underpowered that we had to back up the hill to get home. That prompted the necessity to sell it. We Got the cost of the car and parts back plus \$25 and I started talking to Dad about building a 'real hot rod'. We started that project in early 1949.

### Palm Trees and Car Museums – Part II

On the way to and from a wonderful January vacation in Hawaii, I visited two excellent California car museums: the Petersen Automotive Museum in Los Angeles and the San Diego Automotive Museum. Last month we chronicled the Petersen Museum.

A much smaller but very worthwhile stop for car enthusiasts is the San Diego Automotive Museum which opened in 1988. It is one of seventeen museums in Balboa Park which includes the San Diego Zoo, two concert venues and other attractions. Like most structures in the park, it is housed in a distinctive building originally designed for the 1935-36 California Pacific International Exposition

The 17,000 square-foot exhibit area is basically one big room with clusters of vintage cars and motorcycles as well as individually displayed vehicles running the gamut from the brass era to customized Chevy lowriders of the 1960s. All have summary information displayed that is informative but not too detailed.

Among my favorites was a 1952 Allstate, which was a rebadged Kaiser sold by Sears for only two years. Next to it is a 1963 Chevrolet Corvair and a display about the history of Indian Motorcycles. Other noteworthy items include a 1925 Rolls-Royce Silver Ghost and a group of Shelby Mustangs. I especially enjoyed the "barn find display" of a 1928 Studebaker showing where many restorations begin. Being partial to REO, I had to ogle the 1905 two-cylinder runabout.

Many cars in the collection rotate in and out of the display area. I visited few years ago when George Pierce and I went to a forgettable swap meet in San Diego, and I recall that no more than half of the cars were the same.

One permanent fixture is Louie Mattar's Fabulous \$750,000 Car, a 1947 Cadillac with trailer that set the world's non-stop drive record from Alaska to Mexico and then across the United States.

Like the Petersen Automotive Museum, the San Diego Automotive Museum offers educational outreach programs and events for various car clubs and other community groups. Both institutions are excellent at presenting the rich history surrounding the technological advances and social economic impacts of and automobile. I recommend them for general audiences as automotive enthusiasts.
