

Tragedy with the LaSalle

As I write this, I'm nursing my wounds from the incident with the LaSalle. After getting the car running, I had a problem with it jumping out of third gear and needed to remove the transmission. However, to do that, I needed to remove the distributer and shaft to let the engine to drop down. I also wanted to remove the exhaust crossover and build a dual exhaust system for the car. It was just as easy to remove the intake and exhaust to use the manifolds as a pattern to build the new exhaust. After removing and changing the synchro's, I was ready to reinstall the transmission.

I spent several days installing the transmission and adjusting the shift linkage. On a Thursday morning, I went over to button up a few things and install the distributer and

shaft. I was surprised to find my friend Tracy home and wanting to help — and I was glad to have the assistance. The first thing we needed to do was bring the engine to Top Dead Center. I removed the number one plug and Tracy jumped in and pushed the start button to bump the starter over.

On the third bump, the engine started to crank over. As it cranked over, it sprayed gas all over the engine and me. I moved over to the passenger side to do what I could to stop the engine. But just as I leaned over the fender, the engine compartment went up in a big ball of flames. I also went up in a ball of flames! My arms chest and head were on fire! I bolted out the door ripping my clothes off and ran to the garden hose to put myself out. Tracy was busy getting the fire extinguisher ->

→ to put the fire out. Unfortunately, his 5-pound extinguisher was not enough to put out the fire. When I came back in to help fight the fire, I was able to get to the 5-pound extinguisher from the trunk of the LaSalle. This second extinguisher was enough to put out the flames.

Sadly, we could no longer stay in the garage. All we could do is stand outside and listen to the engine crank away. After the air cleared some, I ran in and hit the starter with a hammer and stopped the engine from cranking. After walking outside, we looked at

each other as we were both covered in a black ash. Upon taking a shower – and for the first time – I started to realize how bad I was burned on my right hand, left arm, chest, neck and scalp.

If it weren't for the fire extinguishers, we would have lost the whole garage. As for the LaSalle, there is major fire damage under the hood and front end. The engine is locked up at this time and I don't know how bad it is. Currently I'm working with my insurance. There will be more information later for how this works out.

It's Not the Mileage

In December I purchased a 1977 Cadillac with 52,000 miles from an AACA member in Hampton, VA

and drove it 647 miles to my home in Louisville, KY. Having no issues on that trip, we decided to drive it on the 2022 Founders Tour in Mobile, AL. All was well until we were about 30 miles north of Mobile on I-65 and the engine died and we coasted over to the emergency lane. I opened the hood and not seeing anything unusual got back in, turned the key, and it started up. The next exit was only about ¼ mile, so we pulled into a gas station. The gas gauge was showing a ¼ tank, so I filled up. The car never died again. Now I know that ¼ tank really means "empty."

The second day of the tour, we pulled into our first stop and, as I turned into the parking lot, I heard the power steering pump whining. One of the locals said there was a hardware store, grocery store, and a Dollar General store just down the road. All three stores were out

of power steering fluid so I called one of the Deep

South region members. Darrin brought me a bottle of power steering fluid. I Filled the reservoir, started the car, and there was a highpressure leak in the hose when I turned the steering wheel. As most real men know, duct tape can fix anything, so we wrapped the line so that it wasn't spraying everywhere when we loaded it onto Darrin's trailer. We hauled the car to Darrin's shop about five miles away and luckily, the auto parts store had a power steering hose in stock. Normally, this would have been a ten-minute job, but the open-end wrench couldn't break the fittings loose, so we had to cut the line at both ends and use a 6point socket with a breaker bar to break the fittings loose.

I learned several things from this adventure. Get to know all the little idiosyncrasies of your car, especially one you have just purchased. Even though you have a very low mileage car, some items like belts and hoses are subject to age rather than mileage so keep spares with you on a long trip. You can always depend on AACA members to come to the rescue.
