

Tragedy with the LaSalle - Part II

Exactly two weeks later, the insurance adjuster came out to assess the damage from the garage fire on the 1940 LaSalle. It was also the first time since that I had been back to look at the car. Together we spent over two hours going over the vehicle to find that the paint had bubbled all the way back to the trunk! All the new wiring, hoses, and belts under the hood were burned. The front bushings, shocks - even the front tires - had blistered from the heat. My newly rebuilt engine was completely seized and it could not moved even with a four-foot long breaker bar. The front headlights separated from the heat, the radiator leaks and I'm sure the water pump does also. It was hard to witness the damage and all the lost effort. I'm still hurting

physically from the burns and emotionally from the tragedy on the LaSalle. It took another two weeks to get the report back from the adjuster in which the damage exceeded the value of the car to be a total loss. I cleaned out the car and removed my 1940 license plates for it to soon be reclaimed by the salvage company. As I am currently looking around and thinking about what to replace it with, I'm reminded all the time that, when you're looking for a car, always purchase the nicest one you can find. I like all-original cars and it is only original once. Seriously thinking about an older restoration as I don't mind a little work, but, at this time, I'm just not ready to start over on a new project. I still am looking forward to our future tours.

My 200mph Prius

In the late 90's, I started doing the rally event called Open Road Race and this is where a State Highway is closed off and the course is a check point between a start and finish line 60-100 miles apart. Back to the Open Road Race addiction. In the first race after I retired in the desert of Nevada, I decided to finish the laugh session on the toy Prius. I put the model in the Race Car and took it for ride and get a good top end for the Prius. This event did not end as I intended, my GPS quit working about half-way through the run and my overall time was way off for the intended speed average. Before the GPS stopped working, it did record a top speed over 200mph and, with a quick

photo from the phone, the evidence was recorded for my bragging rights as to having a 200mph Toyota Prius.

The guys in the old office were impressed that the Prius made the ride and I had evidence to show the top speed of 206mph on May 15th, 2016. The pictures show the model with the car and a shot of the GPS. I have sinse stopped running the Unlimited race car and now I drive my Corvette in a very tame 120mph average and manage to keep the urge to get back in a true race car at bay and still get to see all the people I have raced with for more than 20 years.

History of Auto Touring – Celebrating Women in History

They say behind every good man is a good woman. Did

you know the first documented trip in a motorized vehicle was completed by a woman, not a man? Thanks to the absolute confidence of Bertha Benz in her husband and his invention, Karl Benz continued his work regardless of repeated setbacks. On January 29, 1886 his efforts were crowned with success: Karl Benz filed a patent application for his three-wheeled "vehicle powered by a gas engine".

The world's first long distance automobile journey, of sixty-two miles, was completed by Bertha Benz (wife of Karl Benz), inventor of the three-wheeled Patent motor car in 1888. The trip had proven the safety of the automobile

for travel. Although the automobile was still a novelty in America, Europeans were beginning to venture out in motorized vehicles. In doing so, they explored and considered several factors that influenced their routes and stops along the way. Important considerations included where fuel was available, what if the car required maintenance or needed repairs or what do to do to resolve something as simple as a flat tire.

Touring today takes into consideration many of the same factors. Today, tour groups around the world must consider maintenance of vehicles on the tour, fuel, accommodations, meals and entertainment. As early as 1910, several auto clubs had been established in both the United States and Abroad to support and promote these efforts. These clubs worked to improve driving conditions, pass safety laws, map desirable driving routes and, of course promote touring. How can the AACA support your touring efforts? Let us know.
