

Georgetown ISD Auto Shop Mini-Tour

Driving through what is essentially the boundaries of several cities, one can see where new development is headed. We can navigate empty county roads that still have fields or forest on one side and a new housing development on the other. The mini-tour started in Round Rock and made it as far north as Florence for a break at D-Boone's and then continued west touching on Jarell and into Walburg, down through Weir and then ending in Georgetown at a car show put on by Stephanie Nichols and Georgetown ISD's automotive program.

Some of us living in the Georgetown area met at Andice General Store – a tour destination in itself - for a second breakfast before making it down to Round Rock for the actual start. There were ten members (Leif Allred, Jeremy Cameron, Wayne Heikkila, Gordon Logan, Gerry Powers, Joe and Lizette Peter, Duane Pufpaff, and Bob and Karen Ross) with seven antique vehicles spanning 62 years ranging from 1929 to 1991 and one modern it was a good thing too because we needed the protection from behind on such a long tour. Considering nearly a thousand of miles driven with no incidents or breakdowns, it was a very successful outing. For many of us, the 66-mile tour was nothing compared to the entire day's travels with us scattered from the south near Driftwood and north up to Temple.

The visits to Restivo Racing Engines and Restorations and Fox Auto and Boat Trim will have to be on another event but we had a lot of miles to cover, nonetheless. Our club made a good showing with people filming and taking photos as we paraded through the towns. We also drove by "Staccato Ranch" where the gun factory is going to move to from the Georgetown Airport.









Past Activities

Arriving at Georgetown ISD's Athletic Center found us fatigued from all of that driving on rough and winding county roads; especially the four open cars that were exposed to the cloudless skies and sun. We parked on the far side so that we could be together as, even though we were basically right on time, I was number 110 in the registration of the 171 vehicles that attended. Smokey Mo's BBQ had a tent set up near the air-conditioned locker rooms where we could get refreshed and grab a snack. Most of us did a round to see the cars and then settled in the shade of Duane's open trunk to relax.

The school's automotive program paired students with local businesses such as Fox Auto and Boat Trim and Georgetown Classics while experts from these trades walked the field with future mechanics explaining what to look for like upholstery stitching or gaps in panels and attention to detail on engine and restoration projects. Afterwards trophies were awarded for interiors, paint, and engines along with favorites chosen by the teachers. A final teaching moment came when a young man in search of a Volkswagen expert walked into our little conversation pit. After some discussion about where he was seeing spark but not getting it to start, he rode off with Wayne in the Speedster to find his vehicle that supposedly was miles away. My bet was he was out of fuel but Wayne's generosity is truly commendable and certainly appreciated.

Rare Finds

Hurst Jeepster

This is about a vehicle I never knew existed before wandering around the storage yard at Jerry Dixon's Automotive a few doors down from my home. They work on classic cars and there's always something nice to look at in their shop. [That's where I found my '70 truck, actually —ed]

Willys-Overland was anxious to resume production automobile after producing approximately 330,000 Jeeps during WWII. After the war, the ubiquitous Jeep MB evolved into the CJ (civilian jeep) series accompanied by a station wagon and a pickup. Eager to attract more customers, they enlisted Brooks Stevens to design a new "sports car" for them. He gave them the Jeepster that was sold from 1948-51. A sports car it wasn't with a 0-60 time of around 25 seconds. It also wasn't very popular with only around 20,000 units produced.

Jeep was sold to Henry J. Kaiser in 1953. In the mid sixties, vehicles like the Ford Bronco and the International Scout were becoming popular and the Jeepster name was revived to

challenge the new competition. Then in 1970, the Jeep brand was acquired by American Motors Corporation (AMC) and the Jeepster continued in production as the Jeepster Commando through 1973. As for the vehicle I saw at Jerry Dixon's . . . it was a Jeepster . . . a very rare Jeepster!

By the time we hit the 70's decade, the muscle car era was in full swing. We've all heard the name Hurst and a lot of us probably installed Hurst shifters in our hot rods. George Hurst became synonymous with performance cars like the Hurst Olds and the Chrysler Hurst 300. American Motors was not a stranger to performance cars as Javelins and AMXs were a fixture in CanAm events. The drag strips were frequented by the Hurst AMC Scrambler and Rebel Machine but what about Jeep? What could they do to spice up the Jeep line up?

Enter the Hurst Jeepster that was produced for one year only at very low production numbers: 500 units (300 with an automatic transmission and 200 with a manual gearbox) but it's said that only around 100 units made it out of the plant. As opposed to the original Jeepster, these units were indeed 4-wheel drive but they did have something in common: they weren't very fast.

The Hurst Jeepster was a custom-trim station wagon. Transmissions were a three-speed manual or three-speed Hydra-Matic. Every Hurst Jeepster Special came equipped with Jeep's optional 160hp, 225-cu.in. two-barrel "Dauntless" V-6 (an engine originally developed by Buick). Standard equipment included a roof rack, wheel covers, and a →

→ sport steering wheel. The seats were available in black, blue or buckskin vinyl and the only body color was White with red and blue stripes applied to the cowl and tailgate. Special Hurst equipment included an 8,000-rpm tachometer mounted on the hood and a Hurst T-handle shifter on manual transmission cars or a console-mounted Hurst Dual-Gate

shifter on the automatics that came straight out of the GTO. There were also Hurst badges on the doors and hood sides. Every Hurst Jeepster was a hardtop station wagon.

If you happen to see one of these vehicles, consider yourself blessed and feel free to skip church on Sunday.

News from the DMV

Bonded Title Valuations

Hello, Antique and Classic Car folks! Last fall, the DMV announced that vehicles going through the bonded title process would be subjected to a new valuation process, starting with valuations determined from:

#1. Standard Presumptive Value (SPV), if the vehicle had a standard 17-digit VIN;

#2. NADA Guide; or,

#3. Appraisal - ONLY if #1 or #2 were not available.

As a result, many pre-1981 antique vehicles with non-standard VINs were valued with NADA "average retail" Values – unfairly valuing \$2,500 project cars as if they were fully restored vehicles, with values of \$20,000, \$30,000 or even \$40,000 with the State's valuation.

Here's BIG NEWS for those of you who've been waiting on a follow up to our email from last fall regarding those over-blown values. The State has now determined that antique vehicle owners going through the bonded title process can use an APPRAISAL, if we don't agree with the SPV or NADA value.

From SUBCHAPTER A. MOTOR VEHICLE TITLES; 43 TAC §217.9, §217.9. Bonded Titles: "If a motor vehicle is 25 years or older, a person may obtain an appraisal to determine the value instead of using a national reference guide. (1) The appraisal must be on a form specified by the department from a Texas licensed motor vehicle dealer for the categories of motor vehicles that the dealer is licensed to sell or a Texas licensed insurance adjuster who may appraise any type of motor

vehicle. (2) The appraisal must be dated and be submitted to the department within 30 days of the appraisal. (3) If the motor vehicle is 25 years or older and the appraised value of the vehicle is less than \$4,000, the bond amount will be established from a value of \$4,000."

This is fantastic news for antique vehicle owners who need a bonded title. 
