

#### PART I: THE TEST RUN

#### Ferrari Forever

Lynn and I recently spent three weeks in Italy where we were awed by architectural and artistic masterpieces spanning fifteen centuries and enjoyed ample quantities of great pasta, gelato, and wine. After a week visiting Lucca, Pisa, and Florence, we settled for two weeks in Bologna, the historic capital of the Emilia-Romagna region in northern Italy. We used the very efficient network of high-speed, regional, and local trains to visit several other towns in the region.

Our travels included a day trip to Modena, a town of about 185,000 population with deep ties to the automobile industry. The factories of the famous Italian upper-class sports car makers Ferrari, De Tomaso, Lamborghini, Pagani, and Maserati are (or were) located there. All except Lamborghini have headquarters in the city or nearby.

The Ferrari brand was founded in Modena by legendary native son Enzo Ferrari and today has its manufacturing plant and test track in the nearby suburb of Maranello. I managed to get to just one car-related facility: the Ferrari Museum in Modena.

Enzo Ferrari was born in 1898 and at age 10 was smitten with car fever after his father took him and his brother to see a race in Bologna. After World War I, Enzo found work as a test driver and race car driver for a couple of small companies before starting a twenty-year run with Alfa Romeo, ultimately as head of their racing division.

In 1939, Enzo left Alfa Romeo with the understanding that he would not use the Ferrari name in association with races or racing cars for at least four years. World War II interrupted his plans, but he built his first car under the new Ferrari marque in 1947.

### Muscums

→ The focus remained on racing, but Enzo wanted to produce street-legal cars for highend buyers that could, with only minor modifications, be at home on a race course. Output grew gradually, with a total of 26 vehicles produced in 1950. By 1960, the total was up to 306 per year. In the 1970s, Ferrari was producing over 1,000 cars annually. With some ups and downs, Ferrari production has increased to around 8,000 to 10,000 in recent years. Total output from 1947-2019 amounts to approximately 220,000 vehicles.

The majority of cars made by Ferrari over the years are still fully functional, thanks to their owners' care and extensive maintenance from specialists. Since 2006, the Ferrari Classiche Department has been responsible for preserving and certifying their value. It offers exclusive services to deal with complex restoration projects and all aspects of regular

services and repairs. They can provide a Certificate of Authenticity that proves without question that a vehicle matches the original design in all respects. It is reserved for Ferrari road cars that are over 20 years old and F1, Sportscars, and Sport-Prototypes of any age.

Opened in 2012, the museum is housed in the repurposed Ferrari family home and workshop and an adjacent futuristic 65,000 square-foot gallery displaying about 25 of the most noteworthy Ferrari automobiles. These include prototypes, rare cars of the 1950s, Formula One racers and more recent sports cars. One upper wall of the gallery serves as a large projection screen for a short film depicting Enzo Ferrari's life (1898-1988).

### Muscums

→ One interesting display in the main gallery is the recreation of a body buck used to hammer out sheet metal, mostly aluminum, into the desired form. All parts of a car's surface — hood, doors, nose, and tail — were measured during the hammering process to ensure they matched the design perfectly. The example on display is divided into two sections, one made of wood and the other made of steel wire, to give an idea of the main approaches to this type of body work. It relates to the 1953 Ferrari 500 Mondial.

The main display area is anything but cramped. The open high-ceilinged gallery feels spacious, allowing easy movement of crowds. Its lighting and interpretive materials are simply Ferrari quality. Near the entrance and gift shop are racetrack simulators that offer 7 minutes of fun for about \$25. I would recommend the museum to anyone interested in automotive history, and especially the Italian racing scene.


