
Speedster Clutch

As you all know, I drove the speedster on the Wings & Wheels mini-tour. Overall, it went well but one issue I had with the speedster was its clutch. After driving for hours, the clutch would grab right off the floor which seemed like it just needed adjustment. To start, I didn't know how to adjust the clutch on the Model A so I started watching videos and quickly realized that it was not going to be easy as all the videos show adjusting the clutch either out of the car or with the transmission removed. The one thing that was standard was they all indicated I needed 5/8" between the top of the pressure plate and the clutch fingers. How to do this without pulling the transmission?




Figure 2: Homemade Clutch Finger Measurement Tool

→ After I removed the floor and opened the inspection cover, I had to develop a way to measure the 5/8" distance. I began with disconnecting the pedal then used a straight piece of metal to put a mark on the release bearing and then measured the distance from the line I made to the clutch fingers. I subtracted the width of the metal along with the difference to the edge of the bearing and took another piece of metal and twisted it into an "L" shape. Then I then cut it down to the 5/8" measurement (Figure 2).

Now with my tool in hand, I adjusted all six clutch fingers (Figure 3). It worked great!

The next thing was to adjust the pedal. This is done by twisting the rod down to remove the extra play. I adjusted the pedal to around an inch of play as required.

Before putting the cover and floor back, I took the car for a small test drive. The clutch felt better than ever. I finished by installing the cover and the floor along with one more test drive. I'm now looking forward to the next tour. Hope to see you all there.

The 1956 Mercury X-M Turnpike Cruiser concept car was built by Gia in Italy in 1955 for Mercury who sent a 3/8 scale plaster model along with the chassis and running gear from a 1954 F-250 truck. It was restored by Tom Maruska who purchased the severely rusted survivor in 2017 out of Ojai, California. He used thirteen 4x8 pieces of 18-gauge sheet metal to replace deteriorated panels and fabricated the hood and trunk mainly from photos. It is estimated that he has over 6,000 hours spanning 3.5 years invested in the restoration and intends to auction it to a Phoenix-area museum. Letter From the Editor



When I rerouted the fuel line on the '50 Packard away from the exhaust manifold to prevent vapor lock, I was lucky to be able to use the factory flares. The screen into the carburetor was found to be all "gunked up" as was the float bowl having about 1/8" of sediment on its floor. Starting would take 11-12 seconds to refill the gas line if the car had sat for a while. I changed the fuel filter coming out of the tank, cleaned out the carburetor, and installed a 10-micron filter and check valve right before the carburetor — which meant cutting 6 inches out of the gas line. Finding no factory lines, I decided to cut and flare my own. Even with practice, this flaring tool is awful! In order to prevent the line from slipping back, I had to C-Clamp it on either side and then, after my practice tries, the final "at length" flare broke the 3/8" mandrel! I am waiting on a warranty response from Powerbuilt since the auto parts store wouldn't take it back.
