Jeremy C. reported that this hardtop windows on his Mercedes leak. Gary offered suggestions.



Presentation of "Hickory Sticks" To Belmont Village Senior Living's Men of Belmont "MOB" Luncheon By John Robertson and Rich Bassemir

The Belmont Village Senior Living Facility has been a good friend of The Road Relics club, having hosted several mini-tours over the past few years to display members' antique and vintage vehicles. The residents take delight in seeing all the vehicles and sharing their own car stories. Bridget Bechtel, Belmont's Residence Program Coordinator, contacted Leif Allred last Fall about a different venue: a presentation of one of our Club members' vehicles to a new group called the Men of Belmont – "MOB" at a hosted luncheon. Leif enlisted John Robertson to give his presentation of "Hickory Sticks," the story of his 1953 Ford F100 pickup truck.

On Tuesday, January 24th, 2023 John gave a delightful presentation to the MOB.

He had previously given this presentation to the club in March 2019, but for those that don't remember, it is about his 1953 F100 Ford pickup truck owned by his grandfather and how he came into possession of it in 1976 (for one dollar, which he had to borrow from his wife) and the journey it took to get restored.

The truck was a trusted member of his family. Most of his sisters and cousins (all girls) learned to drive this truck. When his grandfather was not using the truck for his beloved work at Hickory Sticks, it was used by family members and friends for hauling and moving things, as an emergency vehicle for family members, high school pep rallies and graduation events. It was truly a family member! \rightarrow





While in John's possession, life got busy and it spent most of its time in the garage (34+ years), waiting for the right time to undertake a restoration. But John's wife Connie did not forget it was there taking up valuable parking would space and occasionally drop hints reminding him to do something with that truck! One of her reminders to get him to restore the truck was giving to him for their 25th Wedding Anniversary (1995) a matching pair of authentic 1953 Texas Farm Truck license plates. A great gift and reminder but it still took a while for the restoration to begin.

Once the restoration started in 2016, the truck got a complete off-the-frame restoration for a fee that only John knows. John shared pictures in his presentation of the 2-year restoration process. The end result is a fabulous truck. John even had a dedication in 2018 at a family gathering to reunite the family with this old family member.

The MOB peppered John with questions and showed delight in the presentation – a sign that it was well received. Following the presentation, John took a group of residents to the front of the facility to see the truck first hand where more questions were asked, answered and discussed.

This was the first time Bridget brought in a speaker for the MOB or other groups. She told us that she would like to do more stories like this one. So, Club members, if you have a prepared presentation or just would like to do a "Show & Tell" with your antique car or collectible, let the Club know because we very well may be getting another request for more stories.

More On the Speedster by Wayne Heikkila

As you all know from the last article, I drove the speedster on the Wings & Wheels mini-tour. Overall, it went well but I'm now tackling a few of the items discovered on that trip . . . and the list is growing.

The first thing I wanted to do was install a thermostat. Even though I drove all the way to Buda, the engine remained cold. The next issue is that the radius ball for the front end is loose. Parts have been ordered for both.

Meanwhile, I also needed to fix a few wiring problems and to install an on/off switch for the fuel pump. Currently, the fuel pump is controlled with the key. Like most things, one step forward and two steps back. Every time I turned on the fuel pump, fuel dripped out of the carburetor.

About a year ago, I installed a new electric fuel pump and regulator. Checking the pressure, I found I had a pressure of 4.5 PSI – way too much! So, I ordered a new Holley 12-804 1-to-4 PSI regulator.

While I was installing the new regulator on the firewall, I noticed a black streak coming from the number 4 exhaust port. Thus, I proceed to remove the carburetor along with the intake and exhaust manifold. After removing the manifold, I laid a straight edge on it to reveal that it had four high spots on the inner and outer exhaust ports.

The easy thing to do would have been to just take the manifold to the machine shop. But I didn't. Instead I took the longest file I had and used tie straps to attach it to a 2x4. Starting with the highest point of 50 thousandths clearance, I ran the manifold on the file until I got under 20 thousandths. Then I moved to a less aggressive file and \rightarrow



 \rightarrow continued working on the manifold until my clearances were between 0 to 5 thousandths.



Exhaust Manifold – After Currently I'm still waiting on parts. I ordered my parts from Mike's Affordable who

are in the process of moving to a new location. Hopefully my parts will ship soon. Luckily, I still have the bug to drive.



10 Tips for Buying a Car at Auction By Jeff Broadus Vice President – Marketing

Sold! Sold! Sold! It's easy to get carried away when bidding at an auction

and wind up spending thousands more than you budgeted or possibly exceeding the car's value. An auction is a fast paced, busy, and an exciting room, and the most basic principle here is to "know your limits" and not get carried away in the moment. Sometimes this is easier said than done. It also helps to be flexible and pick out several cars that interest you. Don't pin all your hopes on one vehicle and, most importantly, be ready to walk away if the bidding becomes too frantic. Take time to inspect your chosen vehicle as the auctions open well before bidding commences to allow for this, so make the most of it.

Remember, do your homework, or invest in hiring an appraiser if you're not sure how to properly inspect the vehicle you wish to purchase. This may be the best money you ever spent. Don't be concerned about the one that got away; it's better than being upside down in a purchase, or worse, winding up with a clunker. Are you ready? Here's 10 Tips to remember when bidding for a collector car:

1. Take time to inspect your chosen car. Remember that all bids are Final. If you are the highest bid when the gavel drops, then there's no chance to change your mind later . . . "You Own It." 2. Take your time and watch the action closely on all the cars up for auction. Look for suspicious actions such as bidders who seem to be active on every lot; they may just be trying to pump up the prices. Go to a few auctions before participating in one yourself. Get to know the players.

3. If you're not sure about the providence of the car, I suggest you hire an appraiser as this could save you from making a very costly mistake.

4. Most importantly, stick to a budget. In the excitement of bidding, it's easy to get carried away. While you might pick up a bargain, you also could end up paying well over the market value of the vehicle.

5. Listen to what the auctioneer has to say when they introduce the car. It could be that you'll hear something that will make you change your mind or make the car even more attractive. Caution: "As Is" means "As Is"

6. Attendance is not mandatory to bid. Most classic car auction houses accept telephone bidding, online bids or by leaving a commission bid beforehand.

7. To bid you need to register prior to the event. Most auction houses require a "Bank Letter of Guarantee" proving your ability to pay for your purchase.

8. Keep in mind, auctioneers are tasked with selling up to 30 vehicles an hour, so if you've chosen a Lot, come to the stage area an \rightarrow



 \rightarrow hour before your car is schedule to cross the block, follow the action and be ready or you might miss out!

9. Many auction houses charge a buyers' premium which is added on to the hammer price. Be sure to verify what percentage is charged so that you can add it to the total cost of the car. Ask if there are any other charges that might be added to the final settlement in order to complete the sale.

10. Successful bidders need to arrange Insurance. Your new purchase is covered up to \$50K and for 15 days allowing you time to add the car to your policy during normal business hours.

Know the Bidder rules and regulations. These differ from one auction house to another. Most auction houses post these rules online or present them to the bidder during the registration process. The following General Bidder Terms are defined as standard terms throughout the industry:

"Lot" means any item identified and made available for sale at an auction event

"Bidder" means a person or entity bidding upon any Lot at any auction event

"Consignor" means a person or entity consigning a Lot for auction presentation and sale

The terms "Bidder" and "Consignor" are understood as including his/her/its respective heirs, successors and assigns

"Reserve" means the car has a minimum dollar bid the consigner set on the lot prior to the car being auctioned

"No Reserve" means the car sells to the highest bidder regardless of price bid
