Model Spotlight

Daimler Sports Car

The purpose of this article is to shed light on a car I discovered in a Facebook post on the Daimler SP252. First we will examine it's predecessor – the SP250.



Daimler SP250

The Daimler SP250 was produced from 1959-1964 in Coventry, England. This 2.5 liter 140hp V8 powered sports car was also known as the Daimler Dart. BSA (British Small Arms) was the parent company of Daimler during this period until it was sold to Jaguar in 1964. While unique, the SP250 is not considered a particularly handsome design and handling was said to be less than exemplary. This was perhaps due to the doors opening unexpectedly upon hard cornering. Around 25-30 SP250s were used by the London Police department to catch speeders. 2,654 cars were produced from 1959-64. The fiberglass body was labor intensive and took 2 1/2 times as long to build as the E type. During that same period, Jaguar sold over 15,000 E Types so production of the Dart was ceased.

Most examples on Bring a Trailer are currently selling between \$20,000 to \$40,000.

There was an SP250 for sale in the grass area at the last Pate Swap Meet. I believe he was asking around \$6,500 for a car requiring restoration.

Sir William Lyons conceived and designed the SP252 from 1962-63 as a replacement for the Dart. Daimler allocated six chassis for development. The only remaining body was mounted to an SP250 chassis and is the subject of this article. I find this design to be quite attractive but unfortunately was too expensive to produce.

The pictured car is the one and only Daimler SP252. It was originally stored at the Jaguar factory and sold by Sir William Lyons to a friend. It changed hands several times over the years and was eventually restored and now resides in the Collection Centre at Gaydon. Numerous parts are shared with the E-Type and the interior is almost totally E-Type. From a side view, the head lights remind me of MGB. I even see some MGB in the front 3/4 view. Overall, I find it to be a pleasing nicely balanced design. I hope you enjoy the pictures.

Citroen's Clever WWII sabotage

Jalopnik.com (obsessed with the culture of cars) highlighted a story "Citroën Sabotaged Wartime Nazi Truck Production in a Simple and Brilliant Way" that was originally published by Jason Torchinsky in July 2019. The article describes screwing with the Nazis in a clever yet subtle way that resulted in impactful repercussions.

France was occupied by the Germans in 1940 and major French factories like Citroën were forced to produce equipment for the Nazis. A the time, the president of Citroën, Pierre-Jules Boulanger, knew refusing to produce anything would not work but also did not want to just roll over. He devised a plan.

John Reynold's book Citroën 2CV describes Boulanger's sabotage efforts. Part of the plan was to instruct workers to build trucks (likely Citroën T45 trucks) at a leisurely pace - first slowing down production. Another brilliant idea was to move the little "proper level" notch on the dipstick just a little bit lower.

By moving the level notch lower on the dipstick, the trucks would not have enough oil, but the German mechanics would have no idea because the dipstick says it's just fine. Then, after the truck has been used for a while and is out deployed somewhere crucial, the engine seizes up and they've stranded the Nazis.

This fantastic act of sabotage is extremely cheap to implement, is subtle, and there's no way to see something amiss is happening as the trucks are being built. It then delivers its blow away from the site of the sabotage and when it will cause the most inconvenience and trouble.

Although, the tale may be apocryphal, it is one of those cases where people may just choose to believe it.

Pistons on the Square Georgetown, TX – January 20, 2024



According to most car clubs, the old car hobby has been on the decline for several years. The reason, they say, is older members

are aging out and younger people aren't interested in cars. Watch a YouTube video, order the part online, and do it yourself. Their kids are in high school, college, or working full time. They're starting to think about grandkids and taking care of their aging parents. Some are starting to have some disposable income due to kids moving out and the passing of their parents. "I remember riding in dad's antique car as a kid and you know, I think I can get it running Dad would have loved to see me again. driving it."

By now you're probably thinking, what do generational differences have to do with car clubs? In order to market a product you have to know your market window. Everyone \rightarrow

→ talks about getting younger people involved in the hobby and that's great. Plant the old car seed in a youngster and hopefully, when they grow up, they will embrace the hobby. But let's face it, most people under the age of 25 have very little disposable income and very little free time. School, sports, and a part time job take most of their time. So what about the 26 - 45 age group? This demographic is in the middle of their careers and have families so their money and time are also limited. I'm not saying that no one under 45 likes old cars. All I'm saying is that their lives are so busy they don't have the time. I look back to when I was that age. A man that I knew tried to get me to join AACA. I told him I didn't have time for a club. I have a full-time job, a small business, a farm, and three kids playing soccer. I barely have time to sleep.

Fortunately, he was persistent, and I finally joined the KYANA Region a few years later after our son graduated from high school. Our oldest daughter was in high school and driving so we were no longer a taxi service for her.
