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
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The Steering Column


Sunshine Committee Ronnie reported that no one has reported any illnesses among the members. No news is good news.


When we're out at various events I'm always thinking newsletter, website and program. This wasn't one of those times – until this happened.

Moton H. Crockett III: Olds in the Family – Part I


Tightly nestled in an open doored garage space with little room on any side, a 1955 Oldsmobile Rocket 88 subtly hides from the worst of the elements. The car holds behind its dust covered windows over one hundred years of stories and family history.

It's original owner was Mae Templeton Crockett who, being married to Moton Haywood Crockett Senior, purchased it new in the fall of 1954. He was born in 1879 in Manor, TX and had 13 siblings. Mae came to Texas from Minnesota having been born in 1882 in Fargo, North Dakota. They were married somewhere around 1921-1922 and had one child: Moton H. Crockett, Jr.

Moton H. Crockett, Jr. was born in Los Angeles in 1923 but relocated to Austin before his first birthday. Having met Martha Helen Sanders in 1942 while they were studying accounting for their BBA degrees, they married in 1944, and had one daughter and one son - Moton H. Crockett III. Junior took a break from his studies in 1943 to serve in the U.S. Army Air Corp. After the war, Moton Junior returned to the Longhorn Band becoming the band's director and served in that position from 1950 until the spring of 1955. He sought out and acquired the giant drum we now know as Big Bertha for \$1 having towed the drum from the midwest to Austin. Together, he and Martha established the Big Bertha Endowment Fund. He continued to live in Austin until he passed away peacefully at home on September 25, 2019, at the age of 96. \rightarrow

→ The 1955 Oldsmobile Rocket 88 came standard with a 324 cubic inch engine but this is when the "horsepower race" was escalating throughout Detroit and the horsepower was bumped to 185 bhp in 1955 from 1954's 170 bhp. Weighing in at 3,707 pounds, the average sales price was \$2,362 and approximately 57,777 were produced.



That's a lot of car for Mae to be driven to church and around town in. Hers has an automatic transmission, power steering and brakes and factory air conditioning. It is painted black and white and has about 70,000 miles on it. Mae died in 1965 after which the car sat for about 10 years.



Having bought it from his father for \$1, Moton III drove it during the 1970s-1980s. Although it bears the Texas Vehicle Inspection tag that expires in September 2006 and a Registration through October 2005, the vehicle was last driven around 2012-2014.

Selling a Vehicle on Craigslist

Craigslist charges \$5 for listing a vehicle for 30 days. After having sold four vehicles on Craigslist, I've never spent more than that. One was my own and the other three were for other people; only two were actually running, and all were valued under \$10,000. Here is some free advice based on my experience.

The Listing

Put as much data about the vehicle in the listing as possible without exposing personal information like a street sign, house address, mailbox, landmark, license, etc. I've created a rating system for the things they'll ask about:

- 5 new (installed or refinished recently)
- 4 excellent (great condition / not new)
- 3 good (normal wear for its age)
- 2 fair (seats torn but is complete)
- 1 poor (can see through floorboard)
- 0 missing (hvac compressor not there)

Additionally, I'll tell the month/year of the battery and tires and include the VIN with a complete set of photos with focus on attributes and major faults. I don't say where

it is actually located but, instead, pick a nearby public place that I intend to use for meeting in person. You can include "In Cash; In Person" in your post or an obscured phone number (like five-one-two-555-13two1) but I just keep it email until we're about to meet to seal the deal. If they enter a phone number and say to call, then we get to talk. I don't text.

Craigslist uses phantom email addresses with undecipherable alphanumeric characters: (i.e. <u>ab2e2r6db17eeac69@reply.craigslist.org</u>) for both parties. Some say that Craigslist is a marketplace full of "kooks" but we'll break that down into the following online players.

The Scammer

Almost immediately after posting the listing, the scammer replies with something like, "Are you the original owner? I'll buy it. I don't use Craigslist email so please use this address: melodyfrankl1n@yahoo.com." Don't do this. That conversation will lead into "I'm going to send you what you ask for plus even more. Send me your bank account numbers." If I do reply, it will be (through CL email) with "In Cash; In Person" and never hear back.

The Low Baller

I've received responses of "What's the lowest you'll take?" to which I've responded "Interesting negotiation tactic, what's the most you'll pay?" Crickets. Then there are some valid low ballers who will throw an offer out there that is usually actually near the salvage value — could be valid. I'll thank and tell them that their offer is being considered while using that as BATNA (Best Alternative to Negotiated Agreement).

Online Marketplace

The Window Shopper

Hey, I am interested in this vehicle and am in San Antonio from Minnesota for a graduation and would like to come see it." If you have time for this guy, then, by all means, entertain him. This was for a truck that wasn't running and, for me, was a three-hour round trip with tolls and I already had a serious buyer scheduled to show up with a trailer. Regardless, I remain professional and thank them for their interest, ask questions to get information about what they intend to do with it (father/son project, parts car, etc.), and keep the conversation open. You never know if a deal will fall through so keep that door open.

The Buyer

You'll recognize The Buyer as the one who is handing you cash for your vehicle and you are signing over the title to them. We meet at the designated public place even if the vehicle is not running. This is your chance to meet and sus them out and before taking them to the disabled vehicle – still while not giving the actual location. After meeting and exchanging a few pleasantries, have them follow you to where it's at. Negotiating a final price is up to you. On two occasions, I had valid back-up offers so I wasn't going to budge on the price.

Two of my buyers traveled over 300 miles for the deal. When we saw this buyer show up in a custom rig (1960s body swap on a 2010 Dodge diesel dually chassis and \$25,000 trailer), we knew he was going to take it home.



The Documentation

In addition to the Application for Texas Title 130-U form, I prepare two copies (unless you have a copy machine at the place you're meeting at) of a Bill of Sale that includes both seller and buyer's name, signature line, address, phone and a statement such as: "The undersigned seller affirms that the above information about this vehicle is accurate to the best of his/her knowledge. The undersigned buyer accepts receipt of this Bill of Sale and understands that the above vehicle is sold in "as is" condition with no guarantees or warranties, either expressed or implied, for the vehicle." Also on the form is Date, a statement: "I, the undersigned seller, [name] _____ for the sum of \$ _____ sell to the [name] _____ undersigned buyer, following vehicle. Make _____ Model _____ Year _____ VIN ____ Mileage ____. You should keep your license plates and follow up immediately with TXDMV with an online Vehicle Transfer Notification for when the kook runs toll booths or gets red light tickets.

Summary

Craiglist is an inexpensive and simple platform for getting rid of things you no longer want. Be a smart seller. If you're a buyer, try not to be the kook.

The Bug

Hi everyone. Well, I have been very busy this summer. In May, I went to perform my monthly drive in the bug and I took it out and was driving it around. After adding some fuel, I prepared to return it back to its parking space in the storage unit – it gets backed into its storage home.

Putting it into reverse, suddenly the shifter just got loose and was just flopping around. Luckily it was already in reverse and I was able to back it into the storage unit. My first thought was that the bushing between the shifter rod and the transmission came apart. But, after thinking about it for a second, I had changed that along with the front bushing about a year ago. I removed the back seat and the cover that provided access to the rear shifter bushing. As expected, it was perfect and I could move the shifter and the rod going into the transmission. quick inspection told me that it was inside the transmission - meaning the engine and the transmission would have to come out.

My first issue was how to move the rear engine car that is stuck in reverse. I was going to need a hand. While working around my busy schedule, my friend Tracy and I took his trailer over to the storage unit and I sat in the car while Tracy pushed it out. I was then able to back the bug on to his trailer. We took it over to Tracy's garage to remove the engine and transmission.

Once the transmission was out, I was able to remove its back cover thus exposing the shift linkage. And there it was: the shift rod – or the hockey stick as it is referred to – had

the tip broken off. I'm told this is a common problem with high mileage bugs. I thought this would be a quick and easy repair with a new rod and some gaskets. Not so. I started calling the VW parts places and no one carried them but, after calling over a dozen different places, I found a place that had them. It is called Weddle Industries where they make racing transmission parts. When I spoke to the person on the phone, he said they were in the process of doing a run of hockey sticks for my transmission and they would be ready in a week or so. I purchased the hockey stick and asked that they ship it out as soon as possible. It took just over three weeks before it was shipped. I received the hockey stick and found that it was a lot heavier duty than the old one. However, I installed it and reassembled the transmission then installed the transmission and engine into the car. I then took it out for its first test drive and the shifter worked flawlessly. It has taken most of the summer to complete this repair but it will be ready for fall. My next project is to work on the speedster rear end. Happy driving, everyone!

How Can My Car Be More Original?

AACA created the HPOF class (Historical Preservation of Original Features) in 1988 and introduced the "survivor" car to the antique automobile hobby and suddenly having an original unrestored car

adds value to it. One of the many reasons to preserve original cars is to document the actual factory construction of the car including paint, upholstery and mechanical parts as aides to restoration of the same or similar car. From these cars, we can document the size of the flake in a metallic paint or the stitching and seams used in the upholstery as well as the finish on the mechanical parts of the car.

The evaluation process for receiving a HPOF Certification is much the same as in class judging. Parts that wear can be replaced with new or rebuilt parts if they have the same appearance as the original part. These areas are the most common deductions in evaluating a HPOF car. Correcting these items will improve the score of your car and many times makes the difference between receiving an Original Certification and a Repeat HPOF Certification. Common deductions which are easily corrected include:

☐ Incorrect hose clamps☐ Flex hoses instead of molded hoses

- ☐ Incorrect battery (sealed battery rather than a battery with individual caps, carrying strap on the battery, a color other than that provided by the factory, etc.)
- Oil filter that is not a factory color
- ☐ Replacement water pump left in raw cast metal rather than painted engine color
- ☐ Aftermarket floor mats
- ☐ Battery cables not in factory colors or with clamp on terminal ends or missing battery hold down
- ☐ Incorrect radiator cap
- ☐ Non-factory color distributor cap or wires
- ☐ Non-matching head lights
- ☐ Aftermarket sound equipment or speakers
- ☐ Tires (size must be as supplied by the manufacturer)

Any unrestored car or motorcycle that is 25 years old or older is eligible to be entered in the HPOF classification for evaluation. The first time the vehicle is shown it is evaluated for the HPOF Award. Vehicles that receive their HPOF Certification are automatically considered for the highest level HPOF Original Award the next time it is shown. If it does not receive the Original Award, a Repeat HPOF Award is given as long as it still meets the requirements of the HPOF level. Repeat HPOF Original Awards are also given after receiving the HPOF Original Award. At a higher level, there are three HPOF National Awards given at the Annual Meeting. These awards are for: HPOF - Motorcycles; HPOF - Through 1929; and HPOF - Post 1929. They are selected from all vehicles shown in the HPOF Class during the year.
